Governed by board members representing major economic groups and gubernatorial appointees, LED's Board of Commerce & Industry meets bimonthly and advises on applications for tax incentive programs, including **Enterprise Zone**, **Industrial Tax Exemption**, **Quality Jobs and Restoration Tax Abatement**.

LOUISIANA ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION (LEDC)

Led by a board of directors appointed by the governor, LEDC reviews and administers financial assistance programs, including Small Business Loan, Micro Loan, Contract Loan, Venture Capital Match, Minority Venture Capital Match, Venture Capital Co-Investment, Louisiana Seed Capital Investment, BIDCO Investment, Specialty BIDCO Investment, and Economic Development Award Program. These programs are designed to help small businesses gain access to capital, loan guarantees, and loan participations.

LOUISIANA BOARD OF INTERNATIONAL COMMERCE

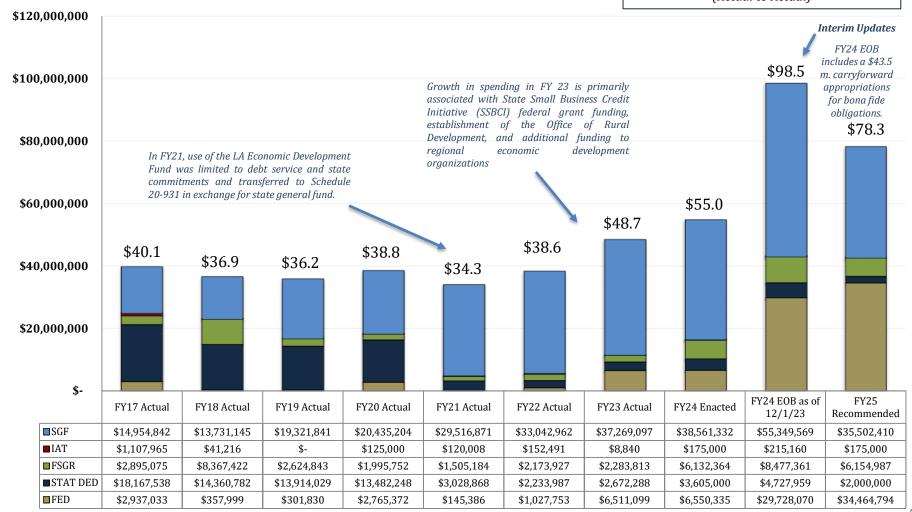

The board meets on a quarterly basis and implements the state strategy to enhance Louisiana's competitive position in the global marketplace by attracting foreign and domestic investment and by enhancing the state's trade-based economy.

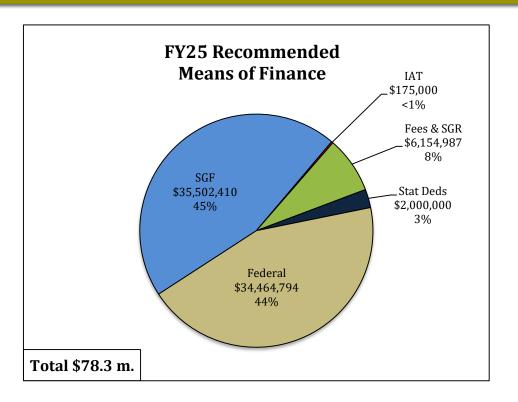

Economic Development FY25 Means of Finance by Source



Federal Funding (\$34.5 million) is derived from the U.S. Dept. of Treasury for the State Small Business Credit Initiative (SSBCI) and from the U.S. Small Business Administration for the State Trade and Expansion Program (STEP).

Fees and Self-generated Revenues (\$6.2 million) are derived from the collection of certain specified fees from businesses applying for incentives granted by the department. The La. Entertainment Development Fund Account that contains fees from entertainment tax credit transfers is also included.

Interagency Transfers (\$175,000) are derived from the Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority (CPRA) for matching funds to support the Coastal Technical Assistance Initiative and other state agencies partnering in economic initiatives.

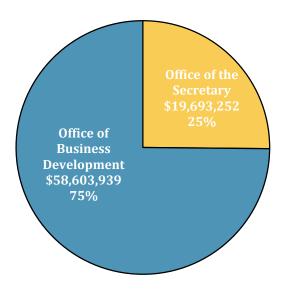

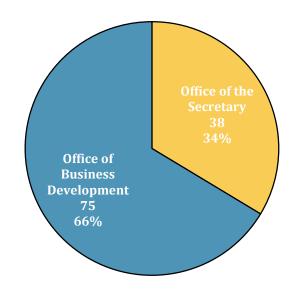


Economic Development FY25 Office Breakdown

Categorical Expenditures Examples of Categories

Departments expend funding in the five major categories listed below.

Personal Services

- Salaries Regular, overtime, and termination pay for Classified and Unclassified personnel.
- Other Compensation Wages, student labor, compensation for board members and/or board of trustees, evening instruction, university instructors, etc.
- Related Benefits Retirement contributions, post-retirement contributions/benefits, FICA tax, Medicare tax, group insurance contributions, compensated absences, other related benefits, taxable fringe benefits, etc.

Total Operating Expenses

- Travel In-state and Out-of-state, including meal reimbursement.
- Operating Services Advertising, printing, insurance, maintenance, rentals, data processing, internet costs, dues and subscriptions, mail delivery, telephones, data lines, vehicle tracking and telematics, utilities, depreciation, amortization, banking services, credit card fees, etc.
- Supplies office supplies and equipment, computers, clothing and uniforms, medical, pharmaceutical, food, automotive, repair and maintenance, software, etc.

Professional Services - Accounting, auditing, management consulting, engineering, architectural, legal, medical and dental, veterinary, information technology, etc.

Total Other Charges

- Other Charges Aid to school boards, local government, etc.; public assistance; miscellaneous charges; judgments, fines, and penalties; interest on judgments; punitive/compensatory damages; OC personal services, operating expenses, professional services; contract attorney expenses; recoupments; furlough; contractual services; interest expense; claim payments; commercial group insurance; reinsurance; loans issued; disbursements; etc.
- Debt Service Principal, interest, related charges, reserve requirement, amortization, and bond premiums.
- Interagency Transfer Line-Item Expenditure Any expenses paid for with Interagency Transfers from commodities and services to equipment.

Acquisitions and Major Repairs

- Acquisitions Land; buildings; automobiles; aircraft; accessories; equipment; software; hardware; farm and heavy equipment; boats; capital outlay expenditures; construction; etc.
- Major Repairs Land improvement; buildings; automotive; grounds; boats; aircraft; movable equipment; farm equipment; medical; office; library; education; recreation; communication; other equipment; pollution remediation; etc.

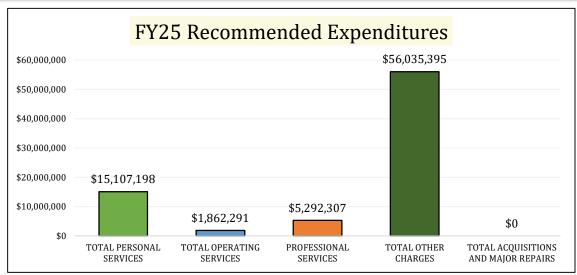

Economic Development Categorical Expenditures at FY25 Recommended

The largest expenditure category in LED is Other Charges, which comprises 71.6 percent of the agency's budget. This houses funding for the State Small Business Credit Initiative (SSBCI) program, the FastStart program, and several of LED's business development and incentive programs.

Personal Services make up the second largest portion of the agency's budget at 19.3 percent. Within this category, Salaries make up 66 percent of expenditures, while Related Benefits contributes 33 percent.

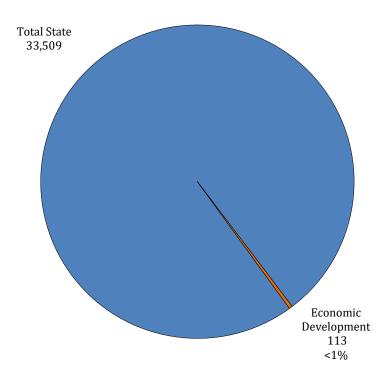

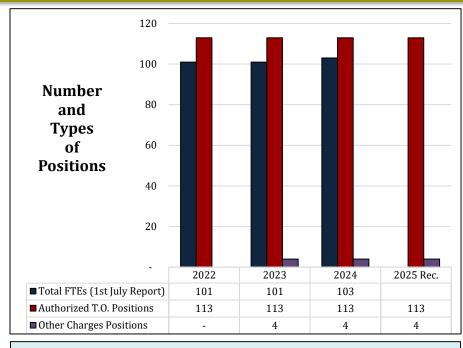

The full-time equivalent or **FTE** definition refers to the number of hours considered full-time. For example, if an agency considers 40 hours full time, and there are two employees working 20 hours per week, those two employees would be 1.0 FTE.

Authorized Positions are those referred to in the Table of Organization (or T.O.) for each department. This count includes only those positions paid for from the Salaries expenditure category for the organization units and agencies included in each department's appropriation. This excludes positions paid for from other expenditure categories, such as wages or per diem.

Other Charges positions are authorized under R.S. 39:2(5)(b):

(5)(b) "Authorized other charges positions" means the number of positions in an appropriation bill to be funded by the other charges continuing category of the accounting system for the state. The number may be adjusted during a fiscal year in accordance with law.

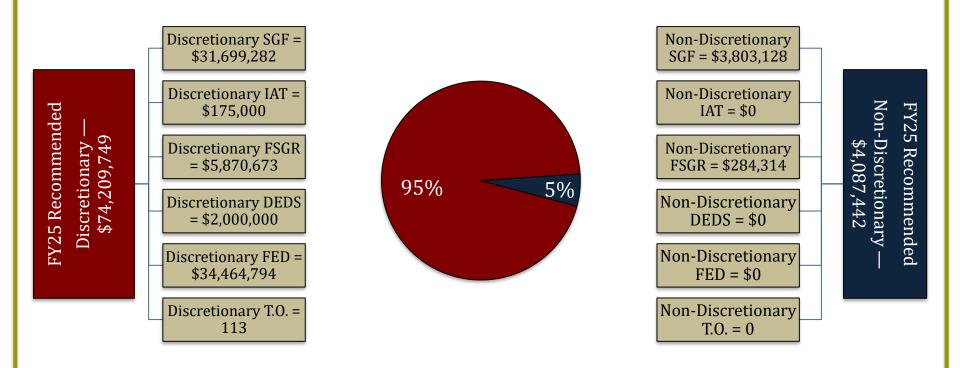

Economic Development FY25 Discretionary/Non-Discretionary Comparison



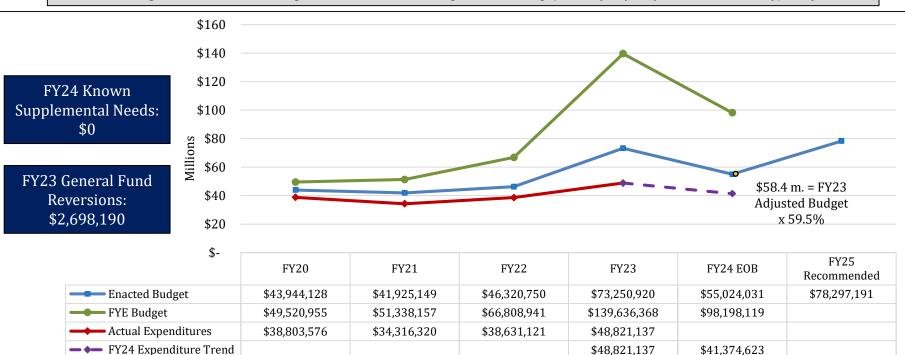

Economic Development Program Funding for FY25

Major Program Funding:

- \$33.7 million of federal funds for the **State Small Business Credit Initiative (SSBCI).** SSBCI provides support of private sector loans and investments to creditworthy small businesses that are unable to access the capital needed to expand and create more jobs.
- \$8.8 million from the general fund for the **FastStart Program**. Fast Start delivers comprehensive workforce training services to businesses that are looking to relocate or expand by providing turnkey employee training and delivery solutions, and recruitment.
- \$2.7 million from the **Louisiana Entertainment Development Fund** is provided for education development initiatives, matching grants for Louisiana filmmakers, loan guarantee programs, and deal closings.
- \$1.8 million provided for the **Economic Development Regional Awards and Matching Grant Program** which offers assistance to economic development organizations in their comprehensive and strategic marketing and recruitment plans for towns, cities, parishes and regions as a site for new or expanded business development.
- \$1.4 million from the general fund for **State Economic Competitiveness** for strategy and planning by benchmarking state public policies.
- \$1 million distributed to the **Small Business Development Centers** allowing for management assistance and business counseling to Louisiana small businesses.
- \$895,540 allocated for **Small and Emerging Business Development**. This provides technical assistance to certified small and emerging businesses by providing managerial and developmental services that include entrepreneurial training and other specialized support.

Economic Development Examples of Incentive Programs



ANGEL INVESTOR TAX CREDIT

Up to a 25 percent tax credit for individual investors who invest in early stage, wealth-creating businesses that seek start-up and expansion capital.



ENTERPRISE ZONE

Either a \$3,500 or \$1,000 tax credit for each certified net, new job created and either a state sales/use tax rebate on capital expenses or 1.5 percent investment tax credit for qualifying expenses.



DIGITAL INTERACTIVE MEDIA AND SOFTWARE PROGRAM

A 25 percent tax credit for in-state labor, and an 18 percent credit for eligible production expenditures



ENTERTAINMENT JOB CREATION PROGRAM

A 15 percent or 20 percent tax credit on annual wages to qualified entertainment companies (QEC) that create a minimum of five well-paid net new jobs for Louisiana residents.
