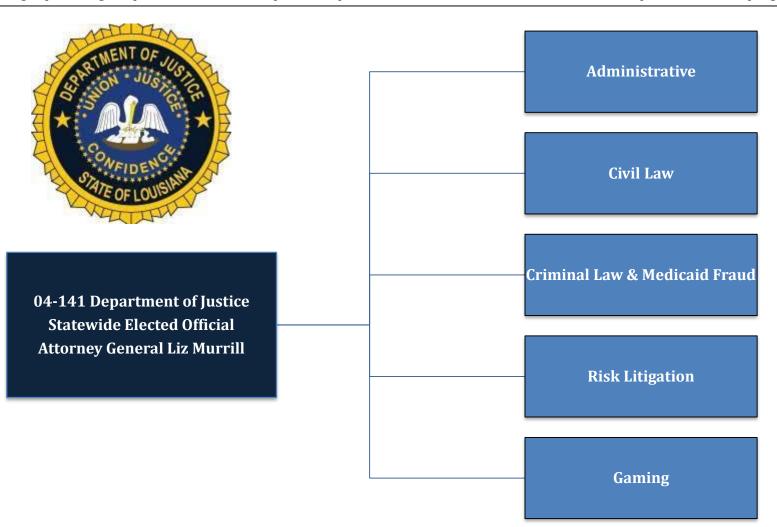

Departmental mission — The mission of the Office of the Attorney General is to protect the people and resources of the State of Louisiana by providing superior legal representation and interpretation, professional and effective law enforcement, and public education programs.





Dept. of Justice 04-141 Program Descriptions

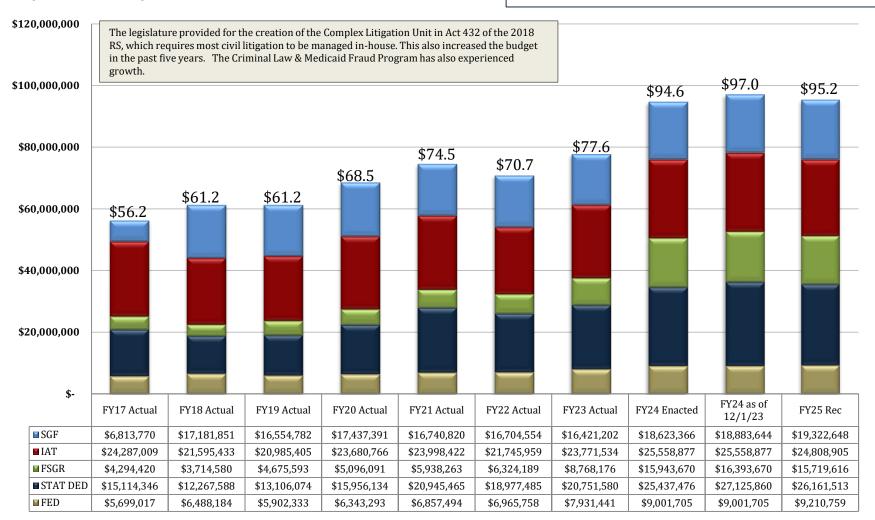
Agency	Program Description
Administrative	Administers the Executive Office of the Attorney General, the First Assistant Attorney General, and the Administrative Services Division. The program provides managerial and financial oversight for the department. Functions also include Debt Collection and duties of the Solicitor General.
Civil Law	The Civil division is responsible for providing a full range of civil legal services requested by the officers and agencies of the state. The functions of the civil division shall include the assertion and protection of any right or interest of the state of Louisiana; the legal representation of governmental officers, agencies, boards, or commissions; collection of money owed to the state of Louisiana and its agencies, boards or commissions; legal protection of state lands, water bottoms, and natural resources; and active state supervision over boards and commissions that opt into the occupational review program.
Criminal Law & Medicaid Fraud	This program prosecutes criminal cases and other matters referred to the division; investigates violations of criminal laws, including cases of Medicaid Fraud, nursing home abuse, and other violations; maintains integrity in government through investigations of public corruption; assists and protects the state's gaming industry from corruption; and serves all other investigative needs of the department.
Litigation	The Litigation Program of the Office of the Attorney General is responsible for providing legal representation to the State of Louisiana, its officers, agents, employees, boards, and commissions in all tort claims seeking damages. The Litigation Division defends claims managed by the Office of Risk Management and by any post-secondary education institution granted an exemption from the State's risk management program.
Gaming	This program works to regulate the licensed gaming industry. They achieve this by providing oversight to individual gaming entities through the regulation of persons, practices, associations, and activities. They also support and administer necessary corrective rulemaking and legislation.

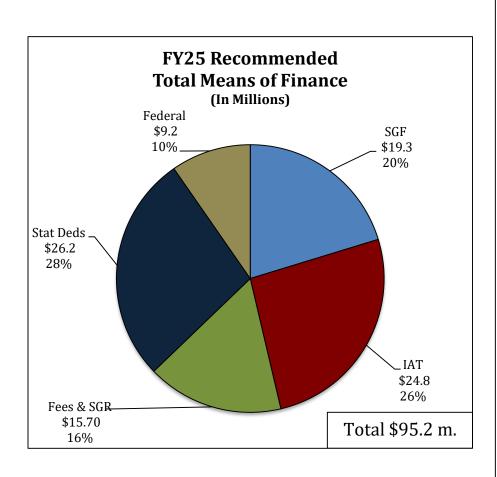

Statutory Dedications are from the Department of Justice Legal Support Fund (S), Department of Justice Debt Collection Fund (S), Tobacco Settlement Enforcement Fund (S), the Tobacco Control Special Fund (S), the Louisiana Fund (C), Insurance Fraud Investigation Fund (S), the Sex Offender Registry Technology Fund (S), the Medical Assistance Program Fraud Detection Fund (S), the Riverboat Gaming Enforcement Fund (S), Pari-Mutuel Live Racing Facility Gaming Control Fund (S), the Video Draw Poker Device Fund (S), the Sports Wagering Enforcement Fund (S), and the DOJ Occupational Licensing Review Program Fund (S).

Interagency transfers are derived from various state agencies for legal services. Interagency transfers are provided from the Louisiana Commission on Law Enforcement to provide educational programming, domestic violence training, and crime victims assistance. The department also receives Interagency Transfers from the Office of Risk Management and from gaming control agencies for legal services.

Fees and Self-generated revenues are derived from the Louisiana Lottery Commission, from participation in the U.S. Department of Justice Federal Forfeiture program, from legal services for boards and commissions, and from the enforcement of antitrust and related laws.

Federal Funds are derived from the Department of Housing and Urban Development for the Administration and Enforcement of the Louisiana open housing law, from the Department of Health and Human Services Medicaid Fraud Unit, and from the U.S. Department of Justice for internet crimes against children initiatives.

Categorical Expenditures Examples of Categories

Departments expend funding in the five major categories listed below.

Personal Services

- Salaries Regular, overtime, and termination pay for Classified and Unclassified personnel.
- Other Compensation Wages, student labor, compensation for board members and/or board of trustees, evening instruction, university instructors, etc.
- Related Benefits Retirement contributions, post-retirement contributions/benefits, FICA tax, Medicare tax, group insurance contributions, compensated absences, other related benefits, taxable fringe benefits, etc.

Total Operating Expenses

- Travel In-state and Out-of-state, including meal reimbursement.
- Operating Services Advertising, printing, insurance, maintenance, rentals, data processing, internet costs, dues and subscriptions, mail delivery, telephones, data lines, vehicle tracking and telematics, utilities, depreciation, amortization, banking services, credit card fees, etc.
- Supplies office supplies and equipment, computers, clothing and uniforms, medical, pharmaceutical, food, automotive, repair and maintenance, software, etc.

Professional Services – Accounting, auditing, management consulting, engineering, architectural, legal, medical and dental, veterinary, information technology, etc.

Total Other Charges

- Other Charges Aid to school boards, local government, etc.; public assistance; miscellaneous charges; judgments, fines, and penalties; interest on judgments; punitive/compensatory damages; OC personal services, operating expenses, professional services; contract attorney expenses; recoupments; furlough; contractual services; interest expense; claim payments; commercial group insurance; reinsurance; loans issued; disbursements; etc.
- Debt Service Principal, interest, related charges, reserve requirement, amortization, and bond premiums.
- Interagency Transfer Line-Item Expenditure Any expenses paid for with Interagency Transfers from commodities and services to equipment.

Acquisitions and Major Repairs

- Acquisitions Land; buildings; automobiles; aircraft; accessories; equipment; software; hardware; farm and heavy equipment; boats; capital outlay expenditures; construction; etc.
- Major Repairs Land improvement; buildings; automotive; grounds; boats; aircraft; movable equipment; farm equipment; medical; office; library; education; recreation; communication; other equipment; pollution remediation; etc.

Department of Justice Categorical Expenditures at FY25 Recommended

The largest expenditure category in the Department of Justice for FY25 Recommended is Total Personal Services at 65 percent of the budget.

Within this category, Salaries make up 62 percent of expenditures, while Related Benefits contributes 33 percent.

Professional Services make up 15 percent of expenditures and provides mostly for specialized legal services. Total Other Charges make up 12 percent of expenditures and provides for consumer enforcement expenses.

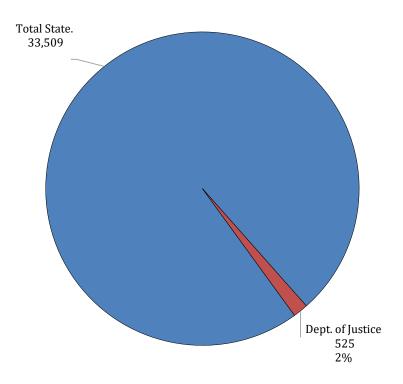

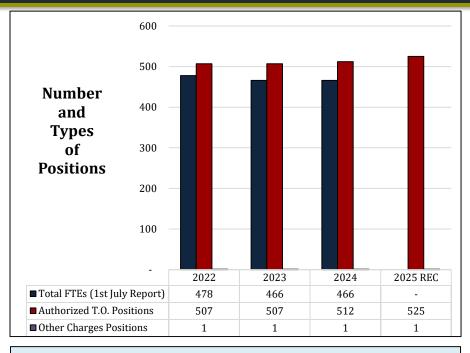

The full-time equivalent or **FTE** definition refers to the number of hours considered full-time. For example, if an agency considers 40 hours full time, and there are two employees working 20 hours per week, those two employees would be 1.0 FTE.

Authorized Positions are those referred to in the Table of Organization (or T.O.) for each department. This count includes only those positions paid for from the Salaries expenditure category for the organization units and agencies included in each department's appropriation. This excludes positions paid for from other expenditure categories, such as wages or per diem.

 $\textbf{Other Charges} \ positions \ are \ authorized \ under \ R.S.\ 39:2(5)(b) \ ...$

(5)(b) "Authorized other charges positions" means the number of positions in an appropriation bill to be funded by the other charges continuing category of the accounting system for the state. The number may be adjusted during a fiscal year in accordance with law.

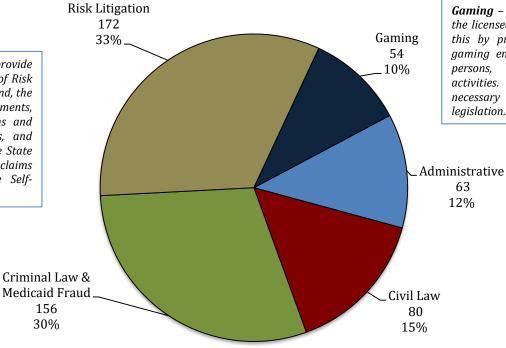

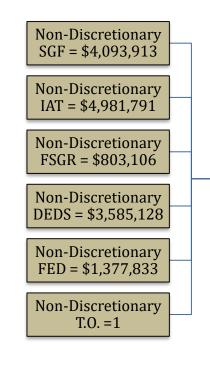

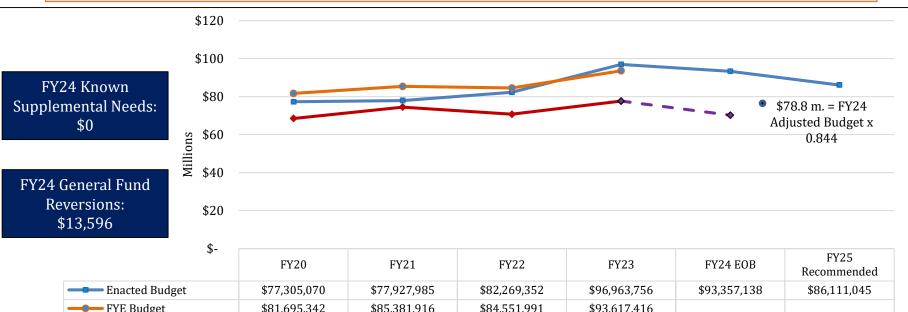

• **Project New Orleans (NOLA)** - \$2.3 million of State General Fund (Direct) is provided for the Project New Orleans (NOLA) initiative in the Criminal Law and Medicaid Fraud Program.
